2006, A Year in Review

We help people with disabilities and other disadvantages overcome barriers to employment by giving hope and encouraging independence.

Goodwill Industries of Southwest Florida placed 330 people in jobs.

We provided vocational and social services to 6,597 people.

Over 17 million pounds of donated goods was generously given to Goodwill which helped to divert over 8 million pounds of saleable goods from our community landfills.

Our earned revenue totaled \$15.3 million.

Our retail store sales totaled \$11.9 million.

Goodwill Industries of Southwest Florida employed 704 people earning \$6,684,183.17 in payroll dollars.

Provided housing for 15 new residents in Southwest Florida. To date, HUD approved housing is available in nine apartment complexes providing 156 occupied units.

Provided services to 74 high school age students through the High School-High Tech Program and L.I.F.E. Academy Charter School combined.

26 students are enrolled fulltime in L.I.F.E. Academy Charter School with room to expand the enrollment in 2007.

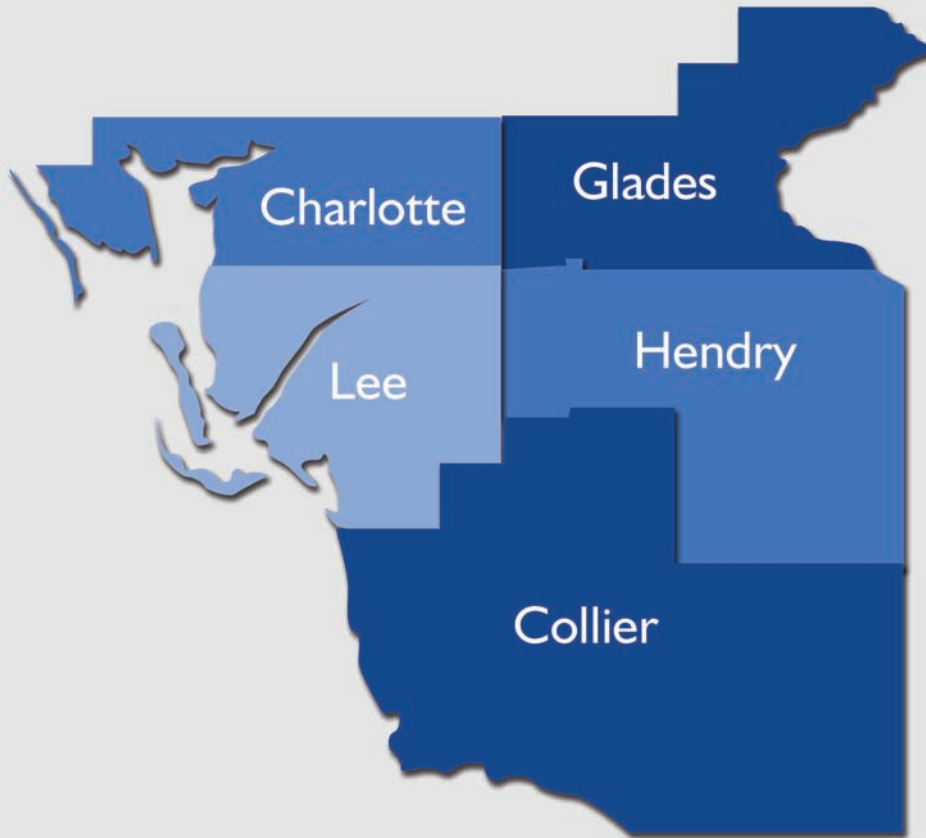

1974 In April of 1974 Goodwill signed a contract with Dean Steel Buildings for \$208,540 with completion of the new building scheduled for September 1.

1975 On November 15, 1975 Goodwill had a big public dedication of the new facility in N. Fort Myers. Although we owned the facility we signed an operating agreement with Suncoast Goodwill who continued the management of Southwest Florida Goodwill.



Building Communities Through Serving Individuals

Good Wheels and Goodwill

In 2006, Goodwill Industries of Southwest Florida, Inc. and Good Wheels, Inc. began a formalized collaboration to achieve economic savings for both organizations.

The ongoing collaboration involves Good Wheels assisting Goodwill with their fleet maintenance program. Goodwill has approximately a dozen trucks that provide pick-up service throughout the five county area of Southwest Florida. Good Wheels changes the oil, checks transmissions, fixes doors, and provides all other non-major service.

In return, Goodwill's IT Department re-evaluated Good Wheels' entire telecommunication system, which included their internet connection, all of their phone lines, and their walkie-talkies. After the evaluation, Goodwill was able to consolidate their phone system, reduce their phone rates and switch to a cell phone carrier, which eliminated the use of their walkie-talkies. This overhaul of their system is saving Good Wheels thousands of dollars each month.

Quoyastine “Q” Moore is a determined young mother of three who doesn’t let her past stop her. She led a misguided way of life which led to her serving 10 months in prison. Q decided this was not the life she wanted for herself and her children. After completing her incarceration, she was determined to turn her life around. Q started working for an organization where her income was not consistent and they didn’t offer insurance benefits that she needed for herself and her three kids. Q wanted a career with full-time hours and benefits where she could provide for her family and set an example for her children. She began looking for employment, but finding a job with a felony conviction is not easy. “I was totally discouraged, but I refused to go back to a life that I knew was not good for me and my family,” Q says.

Q was experiencing a tremendous amount of frustration in her job search. While discussing her frustration with a friend, Q told her she turned in 39 job applications and had not been called in for one interview. Her friend told her about Goodwill’s Job Placement Services and she met with their Employment Consultant Tandy Collins. She interviewed for a job at Goodwill and was hired the same day! “Q has a good attitude,” Tandy explains. “She is dependable, efficient, and willing to do whatever is asked of her.”

“I’m happy that my whole life has done a complete turnaround. I’m turning into a role model for my three kids,” Q explains. “This is amazing. I never knew it would be like this. The future has great potential. I’m going to Edison College and majoring in business because I someday would like to own my own business.”

Five years ago, Candido “Candy” Benitez’s life took a dramatic unexpected turn. One day while he was riding his dirt bike, he crashed and suffered severe injuries. The accident left him in a wheelchair, paralyzed from the chest down. Before the accident, he worked as a construction worker for many years. His position was a physical job that required strength and agility. Candy would no longer be able to do a job he knew so well.

Candy had to undergo several months of treatment and rehabilitation. He knew his new life meant being in a wheelchair. He feared his life was over and that he would never work again. That changed when he met with Goodwill Employment Consultant, Ketinna Gadsden. Candy worked with the Goodwill Career Development Department for four months prior to placement. Ketinna was able to assist Candy in getting a position at Micro Control Systems in Fort Myers. “Candy was excellent to work with, always compliant and ready to go,” Ketinna explains.

Micro Control Systems is a manufacturing plant that produces circuit boards. “Candy has been doing excellent work for us,” says his supervisor Ron Andersen. “He has shown himself to be very valuable to the company.” Candy has been with Micro Control Systems for six months, and says it’s a great place to work and he looks forward to a long career with them.

Candy continues to grow and progress taking on more difficult aspects of circuit board assembly. Since starting the position, he has worked up through setting up parts to actually soldering the circuits. “It means a lot to me, just to get back into the community,” Candy says. “I just want to thank Goodwill for all the help.”

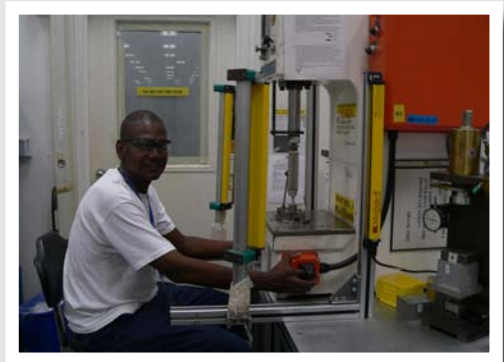

"Pall is an amazing company to work with," Goodwill Employment Consultant Ketinna Gadsden says. Ketinna goes on to say that the Pall Corporation is a great example of an employer who sincerely wants to help individuals overcome their roadblocks and become successful.

Career Development Services

The goal of the Career Development Services Department is to assist people living with barriers to employment and independence. This department assists clients through vocational evaluation, skills training, job coaching and placement, job retention, housing and transportation assistance, and multi-level information and referral services. 330 individuals successfully placed in jobs in 2006.

Goodwill L.I.F.E. Academy Charter High School

L.I.F.E. Academy Charter High School serves students 14 to 22 in grades 9 through 12, or students who are postgraduates who have met the requirements for a Special Diploma, Option One or Two with developmental disabilities. The students learn functional academics, daily life skills and vocational/workforce skills. In 2006, the students had a great year with Team L.I.F.E. participating and winning two medals, a gold and a bronze for tennis in the Special Olympics. The school also celebrated their first commencement ceremony with Carline Poindjour graduating in May of 2006!

Donate, Shop, Change a Life!

Goodwill Industries of Southwest Florida has 22 Retail and Donation Centers and 6 Attended Donations Centers throughout the five county area served. All stores accept donations during regular business hours.

Why shop Goodwill? Over 90% of the funding for the mission of Goodwill Industries of Southwest Florida comes from the revenues produced in the retail stores. Not only do the stores help provide funding for the mission, they also serve as retail training facilities that provide employment and career advancement opportunities for people with disabilities.

New Punta Gorda Store Opened



Punta Gorda store located at 10381 Tamiami Trail.

On June 9, 2006 Goodwill opened its flagship store in Punta Gorda on US 41. This was a long anticipated celebration. Two years ago, during Hurricane Charley, Goodwill lost its original Punta Gorda and Charlotte Harbor stores. Today, these stores are replaced by one state of the art, 12,000 sq. ft. store featuring the "New Goodwill Look" with overhead department signs, brighter lighting, colorful displays, and neatly arranged merchandise. This location also houses a Career Services Center that provides career assessments and job placement for any individual experiencing barriers to employment. Further, Goodwill is excited to be a part of the city's revitalization plan for this community.

The store hosted a three-day Grand Opening event. The special events included refreshments, prizes and children's activities. That weekend 1,792 people visited the new store and sales topped just over \$31,000. "The store turned out fantastic!" Goodwill Vice President of Retail Operations Brian Itzkowitz says, "We were able to take an old tired building and turn it into a bright beautiful place that helps Punta Gorda continue to redevelop and rebuild their community."

In November of 2003, Goodwill also celebrated the ground breaking of its newest project, Goodwill's first 54-unit apartment complex for low – income seniors called Hatton Rogers Retirement Community.

In 2005, Goodwill opened its first apartment complex for seniors 62 years and older. The Hatton Rogers Retirement Community is a 3 story building with 54 units. Goodwill works in partnership with Senior Friendship Centers who provides the residents there with lunches and activities on a daily basis.

Goodwill took huge steps in 2006 to launch a new employee program called ACE (Amazing Customer Experience). The program was designed to improve shopping and donating experiences for Goodwill customers. All employees attended a special ACE training program to learn how to put this common sense philosophy into action. By adopting this new approach, Goodwill is providing amazing customer experiences to donors, shoppers, internal customers, vendors, and everyone that comes in contact with a Goodwill employee. The ACE program will have customers and Goodwill employees alike smiling with great rewards!

Extreme Makeover - Goodwill Style

The North Cape Coral Store went through an extreme store makeover in 2006. The store had faithfully served the needs of the North Cape Coral community since it's opening in the early 1990's. The store's makeover included the New Goodwill Look" with new signage, brighter interiors, contemporary displays, wider aisles and department sections. A ribbon cutting was held on November 3, 2006 to celebrate the re-opening of this store located on Pine Island Rd.

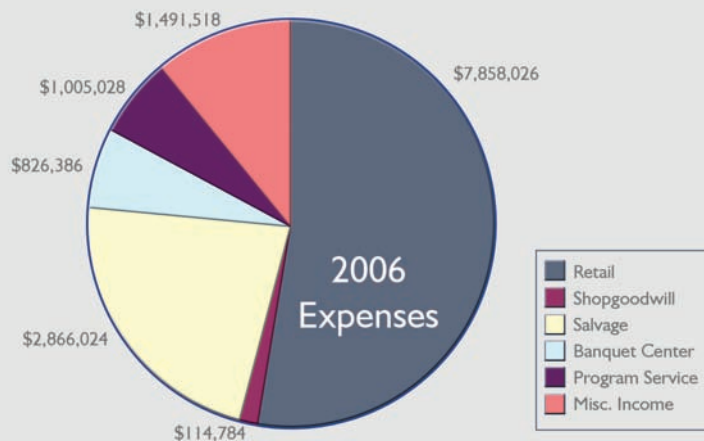
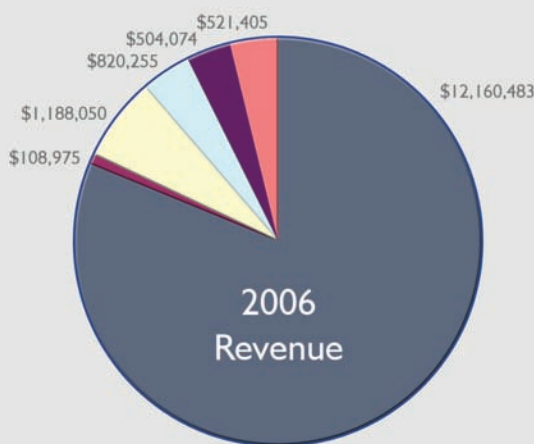
Goodwill Industries celebrated its 40th year of helping people with disabilities and other disadvantages overcome their barriers to employment and independence!
